# Enrollment and Registration

Registration and enrollment in Summer Sessions is done through UCLA's online system, URSA (University Records System Access). You will also use URSA for bill paying, viewing grades and using other services. If you are already a UCLA student, or a returning visiting student, you can enroll directly in classes through your URSA account. If you are a new visiting student, you will need to register and get a university identification number to create your URSA account.

## New Visiting Students

Start by registering online at [www.summer.ucla.edu](http://www.summer.ucla.edu), beginning March 1, 2013. Once you have registered and submitted a nonrefundable deposit, you will receive a UCLA student ID number. After receiving your ID number, visit [www.ursa.ucla.edu](http://www.ursa.ucla.edu) and follow the instructions for creating a logon and using the URSA system. If you have questions about UCLA logons, please visit [www.logon.ucla.edu](http://www.logon.ucla.edu).

## Returning Visiting Students

If you already have a UCLA ID number, use your UID to enroll through URSA beginning March 1, 2013. Be sure to update your address, phone number, and e-mail if necessary. Returning international students must submit a registration form on our Summer Sessions website to request an I-20.

## UCLA Students

Enroll directly through URSA beginning February 1, 2013.

## Requisites

If you are a UCLA student, URSA will automatically verify that you have met the requisites. If you are not a UCLA student, please make

sure that you have experience comparable to the listed requisites; there is no need to submit transcripts. If you are uncertain about the level of difficulty of a course, course descriptions are available at [www.registrar.ucla.edu/catalog](http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/catalog).

## Admission to UCLA

Registration in Summer Sessions does not constitute admission to UCLA. If you would like to attend UCLA during the academic year, you should formally apply for admission to UCLA through Undergraduate Admissions and Relations with Schools, [www.admissions.ucla.edu](http://www.admissions.ucla.edu), or Graduate Admissions, [www.gdnet.ucla.edu](http://www.gdnet.ucla.edu).

## Grade Reports and Transcripts

All grades earned in Summer Sessions become part of your permanent UCLA transcript. You can use URSA to see your grades two weeks after the session ends. Most classes offer a grading option other than letter grade. You may use URSA to change your grading option within certain deadlines.

The transcript shows all work completed at UCLA. It lists courses, units, grades, grade-point average, transfer credits, and work in progress.

You can order a transcript on URSA. There is a fee for each transcript; additional fees apply for transcripts requiring special delivery services. Students with BruinBill accounts can charge transcript orders to these accounts.



## University Housing

The University offers furnished residence halls and residential suites within easy walking distance of classrooms, libraries, and recreational facilities. Housing is available for periods of 6, 8, 9, 10 and 12 weeks. Most students find living on campus to be a convenient and enjoyable option during Summer Sessions. For students who prefer the independence of living off campus, UCLA also offers University Apartments near campus.

## Meal Plans

## University of California Students

UC students pay tuition plus a campus fee when applicable. These costs apply to all continuing UC students and students admitted for Fall 2013. Students who have declared their degree term expectancy for Spring 2013 are not eligible for UC student rates regardless of whether they have completed their degree requirements. Please visit the Registrar's Office of your home UC campus if you desire to change your degree expected term.

## Non-University of California Students

Non-UC students pay tuition plus a registration fee when applicable. Part of the registration fee is nonrefundable upon cancellation. This non-refundable fee, which covers both sessions, reserves a space for you in the classes you choose and gives you access to campus services and facilities.

## BruinCard

The BruinCard is your official university identification card. It allows you to borrow library books, work out in the campus gym, and receive discounts at a selection of local businesses. If you are living on campus, you will use it for meals and dorm access, among other conveniences. It can also be used as a debit card if you set up an account and deposit money to it. ## Libraries

With a collection of more than eight million volumes, UCLA Library is ranked among the top ten research libraries in the country. The two main collections are housed in the College Library, geared toward the undergraduate curriculum, and the Young Research Library, which specializes in graduate research. Additionally there are thirteen special subject libraries with impressive collections in the arts, engineering, science, film and television, law, and medicine.

## Recreation

The Wooden Center is the UCLA campus gym. It offers a range of sports facilities, including basketball and racquetball courts, a weight room, rock climbing wall, fitness equipment, and classes in yoga, dance, and martial arts. Throughout campus you will also find swimming pools, tennis courts, soccer fields, and running tracks.

# International Students



## International Students

UCLA Summer Sessions offers students from around the world the opportunity to study in a welcoming environment that appreciates diversity and global perspectives.

Our classes are designed in formats of six weeks or more that allow you to coordinate coming to UCLA with your studies in your home country. Each summer, more than 1,300 international students attend UCLA. In addition to the other services available to you, the UCLA Dashew Center for International Students and Scholars offers support, programming and services.

If you are an English-speaking international student you are eligible to enroll in nearly all classes and institutes offered in Summer Sessions. Students taking regular classes for UCLA credit should have fluency the equivalent of a TOEFL score of 550. Some classes also have specific academic requirements.

There is no TOEFL requirement for English learners who want to enroll only in ESL (English as a Second Language) courses. Some of the more popular options include: "Conversation and Interaction for Academic Purposes," "Academic Reading and Writing for International Students," and "ESL and Film."

All international students must obtain an F-1 Student Visa and attend full-time, which means you'll need to take at least 8 units of credit. Because of visa restrictions, international students cannot enroll in courses or institutes involving an internship.

Academic, BruinCard, Student Code of Conduct and other policies

described elsewhere in this catalog apply to all Summer Sessions students, including those visiting from other countries.

## Registering

Or, you can go through one of our designated overseas registration centers where staff can assist you in selecting classes, reserving on-campus housing, and obtaining health insurance. ## F-1 Student Visa

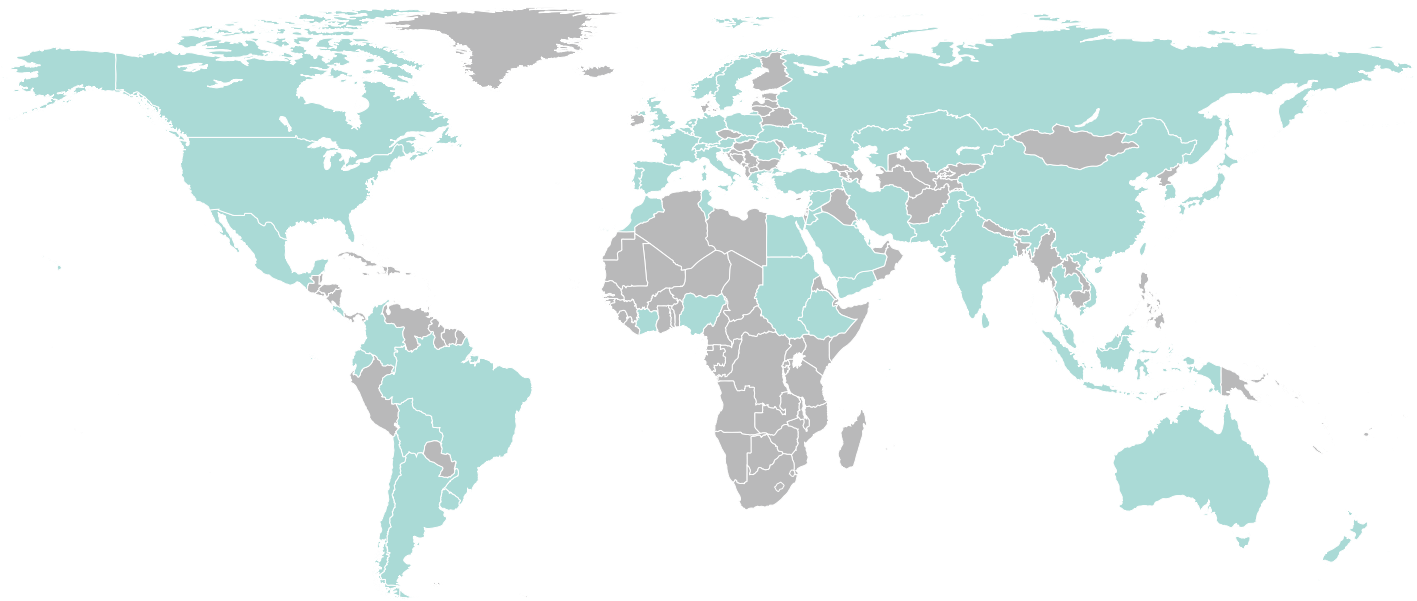
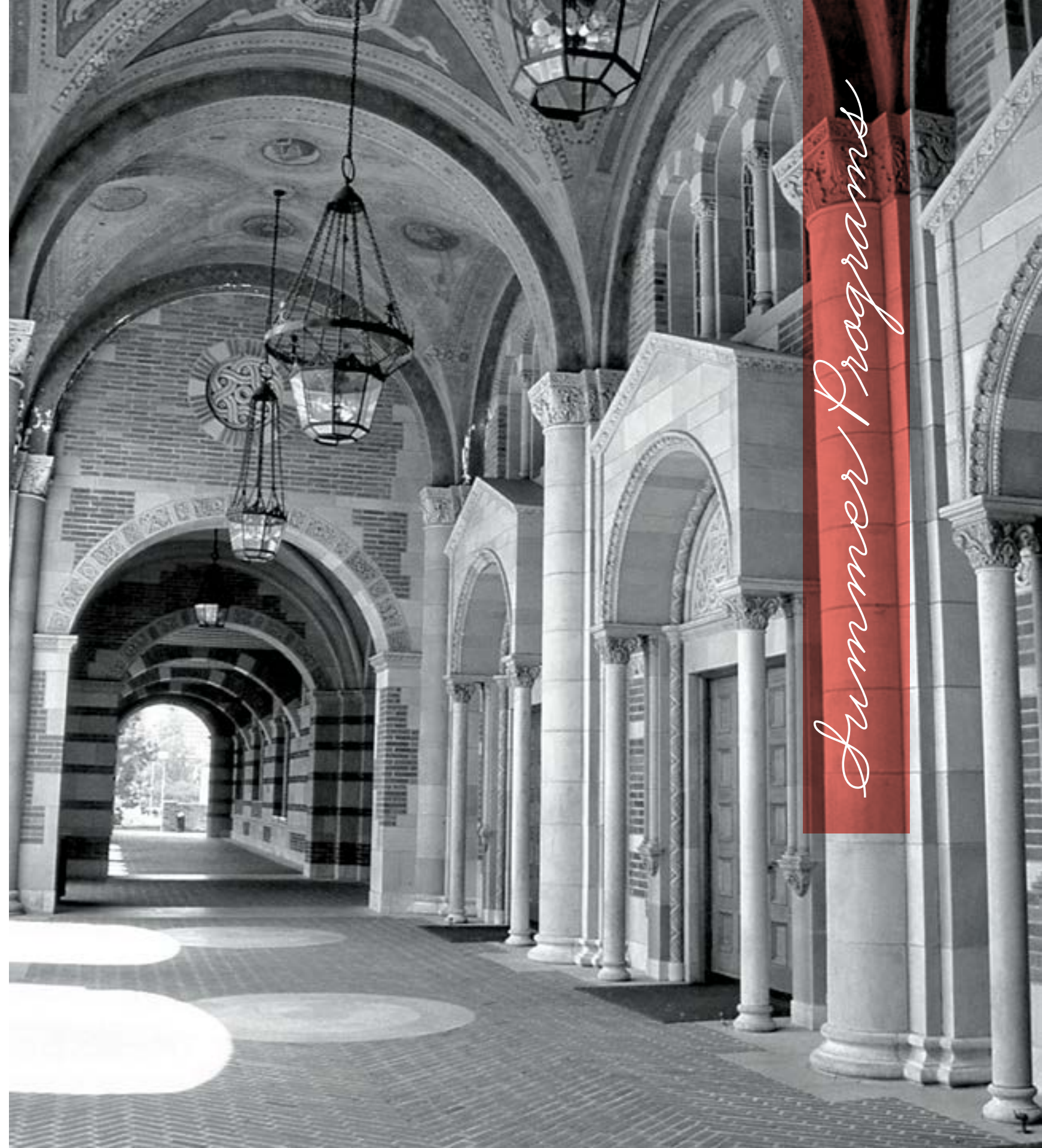
International students must obtain an F-1 Student Visa issued by the U.S. Department of State. Details about the visa process are available on our website and our office will assist you with the necessary paperwork. The visa process takes several weeks, so if you plan to study in Session A, please register online before May 15, 2013, and if you plan to study in Session C, before June 14, 2013.

## Supplemental Documents

As a part of your application, you will need to submit the International Student Supplemental Form available on our website along with a copy of your passport, proof of English proficiency, and proof of sufficient funds.

# Summer Institutes

Summer Institutes combine material and resources usually found in separate courses into an intensive format that allows students to share a unique learning experience.



## Jumpstart: An Introduction to Architecture

An intensive introduction to architecture for students contemplating careers in the field. Open to undergraduate students, incoming graduate students, and working professionals, the curriculum includes three courses taken simultaneously—architectural design, graphic and digital representation, and the history of contemporary architecture.

## Communication Skills for International Students

Two interrelated courses designed to give non-native English speakers experience in public speaking. Students who complete this institute program will be able to communicate more comfortably in public, private and academic situations. Students will learn through interactive discussions, classroom presentations and studying movies.

## Entrepreneurship Institute

Led by faculty at the UCLA Anderson School of Management, the institute focuses on the development and management of business ventures. It provides an overview of the legal, tax, management, marketing and financial aspects of owning, operating and/or managing business.

## Integrative East-West Medicine

Designed to familiarize students with integrative healthcare and forms of complementary and alternative medicine, with an emphasis on traditional Chinese medicine. Students will learn about the theoretical underpinnings of integrative medicine, the impact on the U.S. healthcare system, and application to personal well being. Open to undergraduate and graduate students.

## Language Intensive

Language Intensives combine rigorous classroom work with community activities that take advantage of Los Angeles' status as a multilingual, multicultural capital. Languages include Swahili, Arabic, Mandarin, French, Japanese, Spanish, Korean, and English as a Second Language.

## Labor Summer Internship Program in Los Angeles

Students undertake a supervised internship in a labor union or community organization focused on issues that arise in the work force. Participants in this institute will attend a seminar in which they engage in intensive study of workers' experiences and the labor movement's past and present role in American society.

## Managing Enterprise in Media, Entertainment, and Sports

Students select from one of the five tracks for their concentration: Global Entertainment and Arts Management: The Brands, Interactive and New Media Management, Leadership in Media and Entertainment, Sports Marketing and Management, and The Business of Music.

## Prana Flow Yoga Teacher Training

An evolutionary, transformational training into the embodiment, practice and teaching of yoga. Students will explore the roots and evolution of a flow-based practice where the dances, art, creative and universal applications of yoga are integrated. Open to individuals with at least 2 years of regular yoga practice and no serious injuries.

## Summer Institute in Producing

Taught by top scholars and industry professionals, this institute is a rare opportunity to study the role of the Hollywood producer. The program also includes lectures by industry executives and opportunities to intern with a major entertainment company.

## Teaching English as a Second Language

Designed for those who want to teach English as a foreign language to non-native speakers. The curriculum covers pedagogical basics and classroom management skills. Participants will also get advice on professional opportunities from experienced ESL teachers, including advice for teaching abroad.

# More Summer Programs

During summer, UCLA offers programs designed specifically for those who have already launched their careers. In addition to the many regular classes and other institutes that are available, these institutes offer additional possibilities.



## Architecture Workshops

A collection of architecture workshops and seminars for students and professionals who are beginning, intermediate, and advanced designers. Subjects include advanced furniture making in wood, portfolio design, digital representation and Maya Basic, Grasshopper, Rhino and Revit.

## Geospatial Information Systems and Technology

Provides hands-on instruction in the use and application of geographic information systems (GIS) and related technology. This four-part certificate program involves three courses and a workshop taken over two sessions. Designed to serve a broad and diverse audience, it integrates interactive learning methods with practical concerns and real-world applications.

## Global Women's Health & Empowerment

Designed to provide graduate students with core knowledge and skills from several disciplines on how to improve women's health and well-being globally.

## Graduate-Level Online Engineering Courses

These courses enable engineers, computer scientists and others to expand their technical education beyond the bachelor's degree level and enhance their value to the technical organizations in which they are employed. Courses include: Fracture of Structural Materials, Distributed Embedded Systems, Introduction to Mechanisms and Mechanical Systems, Damage and Failure of Materials in Mechanical Design, Linear Elasticity, Analytical Fracture Mechanics, Information Theory: Channel and Source Coding, Matrix Analysis, System Architecture, Aerodynamics, Organic Polymer Electronic Materials, and Advanced Composite Materials.

# high school students

UCLA offers high school students two ways to engage in challenging academics while earning college credits. You can sign up for one of our specialty institutes designed exclusively for motivated high school students in the arts, sciences, law and business. ## Acting & Performance Institute

This intensive program includes performance training, workshops and a final performance project. Designed for the high school student with a serious interest in theater or a career in the performing arts; admission is by instructor consent.

## Art Institute

Sessions are structured around focused studio work, lectures, presentations, field trips, and a final exhibition. Students select from painting, drawing, photography or sculpture for a studio concentration; admission is by instructor consent.

## Dance - Theater Intensive

Mixes the disciplines of dance, theater, music, and social activism. Postmodern dance, hip-hop, ensemble physical theater, improvisation and issue-related compositions are explored. Admission is by instructor consent.

## Design | Media Arts Institute

Intensive introductory course in four aspects of design: graphic, web, game and audio-visual. Program combines lab and one-on-one instruction allowing students to develop projects and build portfolios.

## Global/Green Business Week for Young Business Leaders

Looks at the fundamentals and current trends of greening and management from the triple bottom line of people, profit, and planet. Includes lectures, case studies, experiential exercises, and panel discussions. Designed for upper-level high school students; admission by instructor consent.

## Heritage Language Classes

Geared toward high school students who speak at home one of the languages offered and want to strengthen their knowledge of grammar, literature, and culture. Languages include Arabic, Armenian, Chinese (Mandarin), Hindi/Urdu, Persian, and Russian.

## Nanoscience Lab

Questions similar to those currently investigated by the scientific community are explored and hands-on experiments combine scientific methodologies and techniques. In collaboration with the California NanoSystems Institute; admission by instructor consent.

## Sci | Art Nanolab

Connects cutting-edge scientific research, popular culture and contemporary arts. Includes visits to labs and museums, workshops and meetings with renowned scientists and contemporary artists. Designed for upper-level high school students; admission by instructor consent.

## Stem Cell Science

Introduces fundamentals of stem cell theory, types and research. Lectures and discussion sessions examine why stem cells offer so much hope while generating furious controversy. Designed for upper-level high school students who have already taken chemistry and biology.

## World Music Institute

Immersion in one of four performance traditions: the Music of African Americans, Music of Mexico, Music of Korea, Music of China. A master artist in the tradition leads each institute. Living on campus is optional; instructor consent required for admission.

## Writing Workshop

Prepares students for college-level writing challenges and addresses such essentials as timed essay exams and effective e-mails. All activities will demystify the unstated differences between college and high school writing.

# Los Angeles and beyond

Los Angeles is an international destination city that is a hub of creativity in the arts and business. It is filled with vibrant neighborhoods and ethnic communities—Chinatown, Koreatown and Little India among them—where you can hear sounds and taste food from around the world. In summer, there are outdoor concerts at the Hollywood Bowl and the Greek Theater. Many activities are free, including stargazing at the Griffith Observatory, and outings to the mountains and beaches.



## BEVERLY HILLS

Just a couple of miles from UCLA you'll find Beverly Hills and its famed Rodeo Drive. The city is home to tree-lined boulevards, carefully-kept mansions and highest-end retailers. If shopping and locating star homes isn't your thing, you can take in a screening at the Museum of Television and Radio.



## DOWNTOWN

Downtown LA has emerged as a hub of LA nightlife, with scores of new clubs, restaurants and arts events making names for themselves. The south end of Downtown is anchored by LA Live, the Nokia Theatre (home to the Grammys) and Staples Center (home to the Lakers, Clippers, and Kings). On the north end you'll find the Frank Gehry-designed Disney Hall (home to the LA Phil), MOCA, the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion (home to the LA Opera), and the Ahmanson and Taper theaters. Nearby are such architectural classics as the Bradbury Building, City Hall, and Union Station. Two new architectural standouts—the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels and the School of Visual and Performing Arts—face each other from either side of Highway 101.

## WESTWOOD VILLAGE

Located just south of campus, Westwood Village is designed around student tastes and needs. It has three major grocery stores and dozens of restaurants and cafés. Among its movie theaters is the Mann Village Theatre, which hosts frequent movie premieres. The Geffen Playhouse puts on plays that are as inventive as they are star-studded. UCLA's own Hammer Museum showcases art and inventive programming. Not far from the village—just a few minutes by bus on the other side of the 405 Freeway—is the Getty Center.

## VENICE

The developer Abbot Kinney was inspired by New York's Coney Island when he designed Venice, California as a beach resort, complete with a casino, a saltwater pool, and a pier full of restaurants and other amusements. He dug huge canals to imitate the Italian city and built a beachfront boardwalk (home to Muscle Beach and some of the most colorful characters in town). Venice remains a great place for playing and people watching; the restaurants that line Abbot Kinney Boulevard are among the best in the area.

## CALIFORNIA

When you are at UCLA, you don't have far to go to explore the rest of California. To the east is the desert, with Palm Springs and its retro vibe, and the climbing rocks of Joshua Tree National Park. To the south, the surfing beaches of Orange and San Diego counties unfold one after another. Drive north on coast-hugging Highway 1 for unforgettable ocean views, lunch in Santa Barbara and tour Hearst Castle. Farther north, you can explore the streets and bridges of San Francisco, the Napa Valley vineyards and breathtaking Yosemite National Park.

## SANTA MONICA

What was once a sleepy beach town is now a vibrant city between UCLA and the coast. In addition to Santa Monica's beaches and the famed Santa Monica Pier, you can stroll Main Street, lined with shops and art galleries, or the Third Street Promenade, a pedestrian district with restaurants, more than 200 shops, a farmers' market, and street performers.

## FOOD TRUCKS

Taco trucks have always been a staple in Los Angeles, but when Kogi BBQ opened its first window (in November 2008) to serve chef-designed fusion Korean-Mexican tacos and used Twitter to announce its locations, a movement was born. 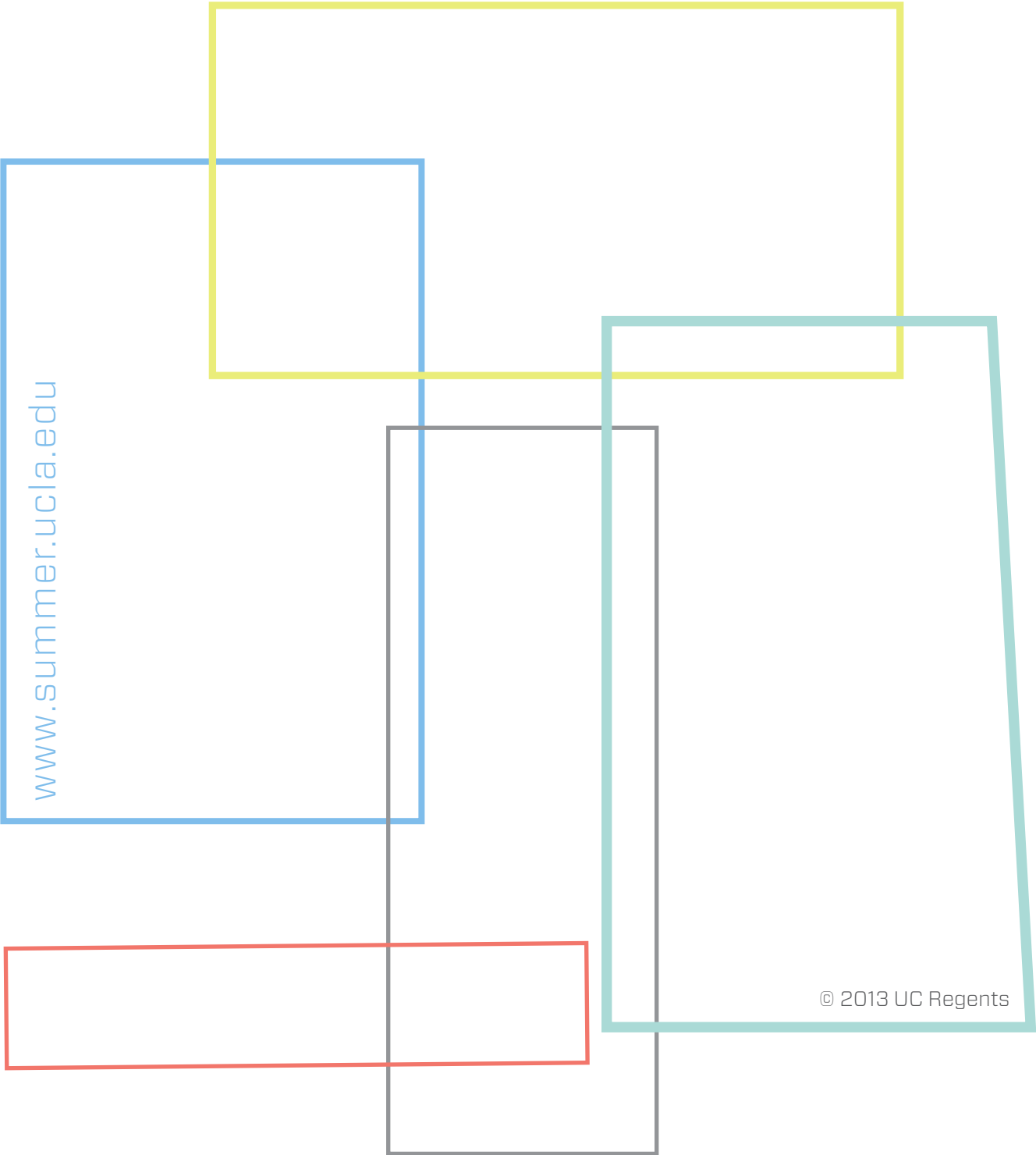
